AREA 4 — HUMANITIES AND FINE ARTS 12 hours minimum covering at least 3 subjects. Examples include appreciation of art, music or theatre; classical humanities; creative and performing arts; foreign civilizations; history of art, music or theatre; literature; philosophy; and religious studies.
