With the approval of the Graduates Affairs Committee, PHIL 9901 Seminar (topic open) will count towards one of these areas when the seminar is on a suitable topic. Other substitutions may be possible, but must be approved by the Graduate Affairs Committee.

(I) Other Courses (for a total of at least 41 credits in regular [non-research] graduate courses; at least 24 of these must be taken at MU [and not transferred]; specify the number of credits for each course):

(1) Transfer Credits: With the approval of the student's Doctoral Program Committee up to 30 of the 72 hours can be transferred from other institutions.

Students must take 72 hours of graduate work (numbered 7000 or higher) satisfying the following conditions:

(2) Doctoral Level Credits: The Graduate School requires that at least 15 credit hours be earned at the 8000 level or above—exclusive of research, problem, or independent study courses.

(3) Non-Philosophy Credits: At least 60—or 48, if pursuing a minor in Ancient Studies—of the 72 credit hours must be in philosophy.
